Why Wirral

Wirral is an amazing place. Named as one of the happiest places to live in the UK, we are surrounded by beautiful beaches, parks and historic, industrial and maritime architecture. It is a great place to grow up, live and work. We are proud of our borough; our local partnerships are strong and our community spirit abundant. Wirral is however a borough of contrasts with some of the most affluent and deprived wards in the UK and where life expectancy varies by around 12 years between the rural and urban areas that sit alongside each other.

Wirral is the second largest Council in the Liverpool City Region; bigger than many cities, including Newcastle, Derby and Nottingham. These are exciting times in Wirral with the planned large-scale regeneration of the East of the borough being one of the biggest in Europe. The Wirral Public Health Team are well respected within Wirral Council, with strong relationships across all directorates.

We also have strong local partnerships and have recently refreshed our <u>Wirral Health and Wellbeing</u> <u>Strategy 2022-2027</u> with a strong focus upon improving the conditions and environments in which people in Wirral are born, grow, live, age, work and play. All local partners are signed up to the vision and an agreed approach to reduce health inequalities and improve population health outcomes. Unlike other local authorities in Merseyside Wirral Council has elected members from all the main political parties with representation from Labour, Conservatives, Liberal Democrats, and the Green Party.

Wirral has a strong voluntary, community and faith sector and partners work closely together to develop a new approach to working with local people.


What our registrars say

I joined Wirral for my final year of training to gain experience of working at consultant level before CCT. This is a split placement alongside the Merseyside Violence Reduction Partnership (VRP). Straight away I joined the senior leadership team (SLT) and was given portfolio areas to lead on, including Sexual Health and Addictions. SLT have been really supportive in this big step up for me, and I have also had opportunities to line manage someone and provide mentorship to a junior trainee.

Wirral has a large public health team with specific expertise in intelligence and qualitative insights. Bringing my two placements together, this has provided a really exciting opportunity to get involved in true community engagement in areas of Wirral most affected by serious and organised crime. **Sophie Baird (ST5-current)** I am an ST2 registrar currently based within Public Health Wirral, which has been a fantastic first placement! The team are all friendly and approachable and have helped me to get involved with different pieces of work. Examples of work on my placement so far include contributing to the Director of Public Health Annual Report called "Work in Progress" which presented borough wide recommendations for action, leading on developing our 'Reducing Harms from Gambling' strategy including multi-sector working, and am working on a workforce development framework for our public health team and the wider public health workforce.

I was well supported to study for my MPH during ST1 and was encouraged to combine my assignments with work happening in Wirral, including field visits with the Community Connectors service. This has helped me to really get to grips with the range of work being done across the borough by the team. This support has continued whilst preparing for the DFPH exam.

The Public Health Team

Wirral has an experienced public health team with staff from a wide variety of backgrounds, providing a wealth of experience and learning opportunities. We have recently restructured our Public Health team and we have experienced Public Health Principals, Senior Public Health Practitioners and Practitioners leading on range of programmes of work to address the underlying determinants of health, protect health and reduce inequalities.

The team includes a research and intelligence function with staff who specialise in quantitative data analysis and epidemiology, and staff with a wealth of experience in qualitative research who undertake in-depth work and provide rich insight into the needs and assets within our communities. We also have an operational delivery team, with staff who are out and about working within key settings to help deliver messages, raise awareness, and improve health and wellbeing in our communities. We have a long history of hosting registrars who then go on to do wonderful things. Registrars are a key part of our team in Wirral, and due to our size, we often host at least two registrars each year at different phases in training. We also host GP registrars who undertake placements with our public health team, and we have opportunities for graduates and apprentices within the team too. All of this means we are well set up to offer a supportive learning environment. Wirral Council also hosts the Cheshire and Merseyside Public Health Collaborative (ChaMPs).



Location

Wirral Public Health Team is based at the main Wirral Council offices; Mallory Building, 2 Alice Ker Square, Birkenhead CH41 2AB. The state-of-the-art new office building is situated in the heart of Birkenhead town centre and commercial district and is a key strand of the regeneration of Birkenhead.

We currently work to a flexible, hybrid model, with an expectation to be in the office a couple of days per week, working remotely the rest of the time.



Getting here

The Mallory Building is well located for travel across Cheshire and Merseyside, and the Northwest with excellent road and public transport links, and provision for active travel.

By public transport

- Conway Park Train Station is a five-minute walk.
- Birkenhead Central Train Station is a nine-minute walk.
- Birkenhead Bus Station is a twominute walk away. Numerous
 buses run to and from Birkenhead.
